FY 2023-25 Goals and Objectives

City Service Areas



Goal A - Neighborhood and Economic Vitality:

Create and preserve a healthy economy and sustain vibrant neighborhoods, Downtown, another business areas.



Goal E - Foundational Services:

Sustain organizational viability and exemplary service through short and long-term financial success, organizational excellence and succession planning, and technology to improve efficiency and service levels.



Goal B - Quality of Life:

Serve and strengthen community relationships by providing literary, artistic, recreational, and cultural experiences for all residents and improving resident engagement and governmental transparency.



Goal D - Public Assets:

Improve and preserve public assets by sustaining effective levels of core infrastructure while reducing traffic congestion by expanding bicycle, pedestrian, and transit options.

Goal C - Public Safety:

Prevent and respond to emergencies through essential facility improvements and community and organizational emergency readiness.

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Homelessness a Year in Review

July 2023

• City Council action: Amended San Rafael's camping ordinance (Chapter 19.50) to comply with Martin v. Boise decision.

Sept/Oct 2023

• Court response: Issued a temporary restraining order and preliminary injunction, blocking enforcement of the ordinance.

April 2024

•City Council action:
Further amended
Chapter 19.50 to address
the Federal District
Court's concerns.













August 2023

•Lawsuit filed (Shaleeta Boyd, et al.): Plaintiffs sued the City in federal court, claiming ADA violations and that the camping ordinance created a "state created danger."

December 2023-February 2024

•City attempts implementation of Court direction: Multimonth effort to work with CA Homeless Union to establish voluntary compliance following Court direction

August 2024

•Court ruling: Granted City's motion to dismiss the Boyd case, dissolved the injunction, and upheld the amendments to Chapter 19.50.

City effectively blocked from enforcing the camping ordinance

Post Boyd Homelessness Response

August 2024

- City Council authorizes contracts related to \$6M ERF3 Grant & Sanctioned Camping Area.
- Adopts new updated Camping Ordinance

October 2024

- City begins enforcement of Camping Ordinance.
- Sanctioned Camping Area
 Opens and 48 people
 move in from surrounding
 encampment









September 2024

 City begins constructing new Sanctioned Camping Area along N. Mahon Path

November 2024

 City engaged in regular enforcement process for camping ordinance.

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City actions to resolve homelessness

Since 2017, City in partnership with the County and other service providers have successfully housed over **380** of most at-risk individuals facing long-term homelessness in **San Rafael** by:

- Collaborating with service providers to get individuals experiencing homelessness into case management and permanent supportive housing
- Funding new affordable housing
 - \$1.3M for 3301 Kerner Blvd (40 units of permanent supportive housing)
 - \$7.2M Homekey 1 award; \$2.2M in other sources secured by Eden Housing
 - \$20M County Commitments to Operations for 20 years
- Funding the SAFE Team to respond to people in crisis
 - Responded to 3,099 calls for service in the 2023-24 Fiscal Year


